Interim Rector's Report

"We will use our time well."

I began my interim appointment at St. Mark's on Palm Sunday (April 14). My priorities for what I anticipated would be a relatively brief assignment were simple: to celebrate the Eucharist on Sunday, to offer a series of informal discussions, and to respond to pressing pastoral needs. On April 29, in my report to the Vestry, I wrote that "by the grace of God, this interim may be brief" and added that if the search should soon prove successful, "we will rejoice."

When it eventually became apparent that my appointment probably would not be "brief," I was glad that in that same report I had also written, "If it takes a little longer, we will use our time well." That is the emphasis of this annual report. I believe we have used our time well and that we continue to do so. Rather than attempt to offer a comprehensive accounting, I will instead list highlights of the past nine (or so) months.

- Thanks to tactful guidance from members of the altar guild and from Eucharistic ministers, we maintained continuity in worship during our "high holy days" of Palm Sunday, Easter, and Pentecost. It was helpful that I had once served at St. Mark's, but the prompts of the faithful kept me on track.
- The long season of Pentecost began with a festive Evensong featuring the choirs of St. Mark's, St. Paul's Canton, and St. Timothy Massillon. A picnic followed.
- The experiment with a single service in the summer at 9:00, supported by the results of a preliminary survey of the congregation, was on the whole well received. One benefit was the renewed acquaintance between

members of the 8:00 and 10:00 congregations! A series of well attended “informal discussions” complemented the worship experience and emphasized the point that summer programming, while different, can offer its own rewards. We are planning for an even more vigorous summer in 2020.

- We renewed the tradition of the “Sermon on the Mount” on September 15 and offered two supplementary liturgies: the blessing of backpacks and the blessing of an oil stock for baptisms. Following the service, we enjoyed an end-of-summer picnic.
- St. Mark’s was highly visible in providing a significant service at the Stark County Fair in October. Carol and others coordinated and staffed a booth that offered nursing mothers privacy and a few moments of quiet.
- During the fall, confirmands and many others prepared for the episcopal visit of Mark Hollingsworth on October 10. A priority on such occasions is to avoid catastrophe! We far surpassed that low bar with an occasion that offered genuine warmth and gratitude. The reception afterwards offered an appropriate capstone, and the bishop’s meeting with the vestry was especially constructive.
- Topics chosen by the summer “informal discussion” group guided discussions every other week during the fall.
- A newly-formed Welcoming Guild is now on point to greet visitors, to follow up with those who indicate interest, and to encourage their return. Thanks to MaryAnn Kiesling in particular for her leadership. On October 6, we commissioned and blessed the ushers, the greeters, and the members of the guild.
- With the support and encouragement of the Vestry, I now offer weekday office hours at St. Mark’s. The schedule for the following week appears in the bulletin each Sunday.

The list could be longer, but these items taken together describe a parish held together by faith, blessed by grace, and committed to a vigorous future.

Every pastoral appointment is for an “interim.” We are making the most of this one. Thanks be to God.

Parish Musician's Report

My 22nd year as organist/director here at St. Mark's - a church which is a model of devotional excellence in rich liturgical practice.

Because of the Weaver Child Development Center expansion, the Kathleen Morrison Choir Room re-located to a smaller space since we are now rehearsing primarily in the chancel. Beck and Bill Rand, Pam McCarthy, Bob Kennedy, and Charlie Kiesling cleaned, re-decorated and refurbished the new space and moved the cabinets, robes, music, books, wall decor, chairs, and the Charles R. Walter piano (in memory of Jim Baines). Our interim Rector, Dr. Paul Gaston, prepared a dedicatory liturgy which took place after a September service. Photographer Bill Rand has captured these moments in vibrant colors with his camera expertise.

We joined with the choirs of St. Paul's and St. Tim's for an Epiphany event and a recent Evensong, and hosted a gala Pentecost service June 9th for the three churches with Dr. Steve Grimo, timpani, and Chef Carol Popovich's outdoor cookout. Ron Hill has continued to be our resident pianist as health issues permit, and his loan of an electronic keyboard has filled the sanctuary with harpsichord effects during Communion, and selected orchestral voices played by Bruce Schutrum. Our resident timpanist John Gregory is still recovering from physical issues. Handbells and Choir Chimes have been used at festive events. My caregiver Ray Slinger has loaned a keyboard for the outdoor service. Norm Warren and Ken Jaeb are our Cantors, and guests have included Danny Reiman, Gail Martin, Catherine Dillon, David J.White, and pianist Joyce Elaine Corbett.

It is a distinct pleasure to make music in such a healthy environment in this corner of God's vineyard called St. Mark's.

And, finally: an invitation to consider singing with us. We rehearse Sunday mornings before the 10:00 service. If you have a blending voice and a desire to render significant service to our Lord, what better way?

Bylaws Change: Proposed Language

- a. In the time of transition where a permanent rector is not in place, the Vestry may choose to temporarily appoint the Senior and Junior Warden beyond their respective terms by a majority vote. The duration of this temporary appointment should last no more than three months beyond the start date of the new rector. These positions shall be in addition to the normal number of Vestry members and shall not reduce the number seats available for new Vestry members. These positions shall retain voting rights during their temporary appointment.

6. **Approval of Minutes of December 2, 2018, Special Meeting (handout)**

 - Vestry Meeting Quorum: Reduce the Vestry quorum requirement from 7 to 5.
 - Special Meeting of the Parish: Reduce the number of Qualified Electors to call a Special Meeting of the Parish from 40 to 20.
 - Joe Hoot motioned to accept the Minutes of the December 2, 2018, Special Meeting. The motion was seconded by Chuck Violand and the motion was approved.
7. **Appointment of Tellers** – Tellers were not needed, as candidates were running unopposed.
8. **Report of the Nominating Committee (Bruce Hixon)**
 - The members of the Nominating Committee were outgoing Vestry members Beth Crowl, Bruce Hixon, and Charlie Kiesling.
 - Beck Rand was appointed to fill the remaining two years of the Class of 2018 vacancy.
 - Nominees for the Class of 2019 are Linda Deuble, Caroline Willoughby, and John Wise.
9. **Opening of Polls**
 - Anne Coen made a motion to elect the three candidates by voice vote. Judy Hixon seconded the motion. The motion was approved, and all three candidates were elected unanimously.
10. **Interim Rector's Report and Introduction to *The Way of Love* Lenten Program**
 - Rev. Beth's report was covered in her sermon and is included in the handout with the Annual Committee Reports.
 - Our Lenten Program in 2019 will be Bishop Curry's *The Way of Love Program* which promotes reflection, discernment, and commitment around the practices of "Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, and Rest".
 - Rev. Beth thanked Bob Morrison and Ron Hill for sharing their musical gifts with our parish.
 - Rev. Beth thanked the Finance Committee and the Trustees for creating the 5-year Financial Plan, ensuring that we will be able to afford a full-time rector.
