Rector's Report

2022 was a year in which we were able to see renewed life emerge at St. Mark's. Although we continue to stream our services on Facebook, most people are now comfortable returning to in person worship. In addition to services, we have resumed many of our fellowship events, including offering coffee and fellowship after services, offering receptions following funerals, and sharing meals in the undercroft. I am grateful to Carol and her team of kitchen helpers, and to the Stewardship Committee for making these events happen.

We also held our first inter-generational service since the start of the pandemic. It was a wonderful service. I am thankful to Emily and others involved with planning and holding the event. It is our plan to hold an intergenerational service four times each year. As our children get older, it would be helpful to establish a second Sunday School class to address the diversity in ages and interests. To do so, we will need a few volunteers to facilitate that class. Those volunteers will be provided with training and materials.

Last year I set three short term goals for St. Mark's. The first was to establish an Outreach Committee and find one outreach program with which we might become regularly involved. The Outreach Committee is Gary Mull, Mandy Pelger, and Sue Little. We began a regular outreach to Gibbs Elementary's First Friday program. Members of St. Mark's have participated in the program, and everyone who has participated has found it a fulfilling experience.

The second was to build a stronger relationship with Weaver Child Development Center. This goal hit a number of roadblocks. We are not giving up. Geoff Gordon was appointed by the Vestry to be a liaison between St. Mark's and the Weaver board. He has begun meeting with a member of Weaver's board.

The third goal was to add at least six households to St. Mark's over the course of the year. We were able to achieve that goal and have some wonderful additions to our St. Mark's family.

I also set two long term goals for St. Mark's. The first is to have an average Sunday attendance of at least 100 people by 2027. We are on our way to achieving that goal, and if we continue to add households every year, we will achieve and, most likely, exceed that goal.

The second long term goal is to have a budget that does not require us to spend principle from our endowment to fund operating expenses. Thanks to the efforts of our Stewardship Committee and the generosity of our members, our pledges increased for 2023 despite the loss of several significant donors to relocation and death.

In 2023, I would like to see St. Mark's add at least seven households to our congregation. I would also like to add another outreach opportunity for those who are unable to participate in the First Friday program at Gibbs. We are on a positive trajectory. With the leadership and power of the Holy Spirit, we can reach many for the sake of the Gospel.

I have begun a Doctor of Ministry program at Lexington Theological Seminary and am gaining new tools and insights to increasing our capacity for ministry. As 2023 unfolds, I hope to use these tools to the benefit of St. Mark's and the communities in which we live, work, and play.

And I would be remiss if I did not thank Charlie Keisling and the members of the Finance Committee for their hard work in managing the budget for St. Mark's. And last but not least a big thank you to Joe Hoot and the Stewardship Committee for a fresh and effective new approach to the Stewardship Season.

We have not had a direct liaison with Weaver School since Rhonda Warren moved to Florida. Geoff Gordon has agreed to take on that role and we're looking forward to improved communication and interaction with the school.

Finally, thank you to all the Vestry members I've had the pleasure to serve with the past three years, and to the Vestry Candidates who answered the call to serve and will soon be joining the "new" Vestry for 2023.

This is a hopeful time for St. Mark's and I urge every parishioner to consider how they can become more deeply involved in securing the future of St. Mark's.

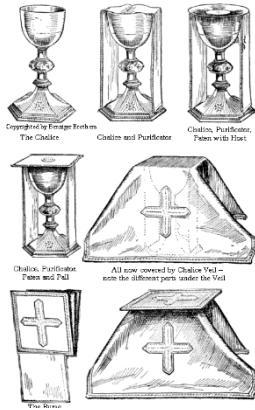

Altar Guild

Altar Guild had a wonderful year!

At the beginning of the year the Stewardship Committee recruited seven new members for us, and we were most pleased to welcome Cindy Brown, Beth Crowl, Linda Deuble, Bobbi Gordon, Pat Silagy-Wesson, Kathy Sloan, and Karen Violand into the group. Their enthusiasm and commitment has energized us all.

Special thanks go to Marilyn Thorp who has stepped forward to polish the silver for us. You have probably noticed that it just gleams. Marilyn has offered to polish it every few months, and for this we are most grateful.



As you also may have noticed, the altar now looks different for communion services. We are “vesting the chalice.” Instead of having it on the table behind the altar, it now sits on the corporal in the middle of the altar during the service. The corporal is a large, square piece of linen which is spread on the altar cloth to collect any fragments of the consecrated host.

Over the chalice we drape a purificator (a rectangular shaped napkin that is used to clean the inside of the chalice) which has been folded three times. On top of the purificator is the paten, the small plate which holds the eucharist. The paten is then topped with the pall (a stiffened square card made from white linen) which protects the bread. A veil is then placed overall. The color of the veil reflects the season of the year. On the top is the burse (two squares of stiff material which are hinged on one side) which holds an additional purificator.

We were sad to announce that the fee for flower dedications had to be raised for 2023 from \$15.00 to \$20.00 per donation. The change reflects an increase in our cost for the flowers, and are grateful that the florist has kept our prices so low for many years.

Altar Guild continues to cover the expense for the water cooler in the family room.

The Altar Guild is a volunteer group of the parish whose ministry is to care for the altar, vessels, and altar linens of the parish. Altar Guild members prepare the sanctuary for services and clean up afterwards. Altar Guild members frequently supervise the decoration of the sanctuary of the parish with flowers.

Hope Outreach Ministry

We have had a long relationship with Hope Outreach Ministry, going back to the original CODE WARM (Bradley's Blanket Brigade) project started in 2015. Our initial focus was collecting blankets for the homeless families served by Hope Outreach Ministry, located at 1530 Superior Avenue NE in inner-city Canton. Soon we were collecting all types of winter items including hats, mittens, coats, scarves, and gloves. Next, we expanded to include all types of men's women's, and children's clothing.

After the COVID shutdown, we rebooted our efforts, and last year focused on operating a collection center for Hope's Blessing Box Project. The Blessing Box at Hope is stocked with personal care items and emergency food items and is open to the homeless 24 hours a day. We collected items to support this mission with our own "Hope Chest" located in the Narthex. Collected items were delivered directly to Hope on a regular basis. For the coming

year, The St. Mark's Sunday School is organizing a program to collect full size bar soaps, wash cloths, and storage bags so that the homeless will all be able to have a personal hygiene bag that they can use more than just one time. What a wonderful, idea to keep our mission of service moving forward.

First, a hearty thank you to Patty Kapper for being one of the writers of the notecards. Her willingness and dedication to this ministry is appreciated. In midsummer, Patty relocated to Arizona to live with her daughter and son-in-law. Her overall participation in our parish is sorely missed.

Second, a BIG thank you to Bobbi Zollinger for agreeing to be a writer of the Parish Notecards. We're pleased that she and her husband Fred have permanently relocated back in North Canton. Her participation will provide another spiritual perspective in our community.

Our original intent was, and continues to be, to reach out to those parishioners who are ill, homebound, have some special need, or we haven't seen lately. It's a friendly way of keeping in touch. Fr. RJ signs, prays over, then mails the notecards. We thank him for all his support for this ministry.

Our notecard ministry has reached many people. We writers always pray for the person or family, specifically that the person or family receives some comfort and inclusion in our St. Mark's community from our cards!

The notecards are sent 3 – 4 times a year, at non holiday times. The first "round" was in March to 12 folks; the second "round" was sent in July to 9; and the third "round" was sent in November to 25! In addition, there were individual notecards sent in May to 2 folks, in June to 2, in December to 3. The recipient lists are shared only with the wardens and the office.

NEW MINISTRY: At this time, a new ministry is being launched! Birthdays and anniversaries are familial celebrations often observed by receiving cards. If your special dates are listed in our directory (or you are seen receiving a blessing from Fr RJ!) the intent is that you will receive a card from our St. Mark's family signed by Fr RJ. This ministry has its beginning January, 2023.

A thank you is in order to Katie for assistance in designing and printing these new cards, as well as purchasing the supplies for it.

St. Mark's Annual Meeting Minutes

January 22, 2022

1. Call to Order
 - The Annual Meeting was held in person, as well as virtually via Zoom for those unable to attend in person.
 - The meeting was called to order at 11:09am.
 - Derek Gordon explained to those present on Zoom how to vote, ask questions, and make comments.
2. Opening Prayer
 - Fr. RJ Johnson opened the meeting with a prayer.
3. Determination of a Quorum
 - A quorum was declared with 38 parishioners present and 9 logins on Zoom.
4. Adoption of Time Allotment / Speaking Rules
 - Old and New Business item discussions are limited to 30 minutes and remarks are limited to 3 minutes each.
 - Speaking rules were declared and approved unanimously.
5. Approval of 2021 Annual Meeting Minutes
 - The minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting were included in the Annual Meeting packet.
 - There were no corrections or discussion.
 - Derek Gordon motioned to approve the Minutes from the 2021 Annual Meeting. Geoff Gordon seconded the motion, and the motion was approved unanimously.
6. Appointment of Tellers
 - Tellers were not needed, as the candidates were running unopposed.
7. Report of the Nominating Committee
 - Nominees for the Vestry Class of 2022 are Leslie Redmon, Sara Strattan, and John Willoughby.
8. Opening of Polls
 - The Polls were opened and there were no nominations from the floor.
 - John Wise made a motion to close the nominations and accept the Report of the Nominating Committee. Pam McCarthy seconded the motion, and the motion was unanimously approved.
 - Jim Weaver motioned to close the polls and elect the three candidates by voice vote. Emily Gordon seconded the motion. The motion was approved, and all three candidates were elected unanimously.
9. Rector's Report
 - The full Rector's Report is in the Annual Meeting packet.
 - Fr. RJ expressed his appreciation for the retiring Vestry members and all Ministry leaders. He is especially appreciative that our lay leaders can so capably run services in his absence.
 - Fr. RJ presented 6 goals for the parish:
 - Add 6 households to the parish this year.
 - Establish a Missions Committee to bring at least one outreach opportunity to St. Mark's, something we can all share in and do together beyond just giving

- donations.
- o Develop a closer relationship with Weaver School.
- o Attain average Sunday attendance of 100 parishioners.
- o Balance the budget within 5 years.
- Fr. RJ requested that parishioners attend the Diocese's Winter Convocation, which will be held virtually via Zoom in February. The program is "20 Days of Evangelism" and may help us with our parish's goals.

- Senior Warden John Wise's report is included in the Annual Report packet.
- Junior Warden Bruce Hixon's report is included in the Annual Report packet.

11. 2021 Financial Report and 2022 Missional Operating Budget

- Finance Committee member Sara Strattan presented the Financial Reports that are included in the Annual Meeting packet.
- Sara expressed her appreciation for Treasurer Charlie Kiesling's leadership and Chairmanship of the Finance Committee. He has simplified and improved transparency in the financial reporting, while providing necessary detail for the Finance Committee. He has worked on the parish's behalf to obtain funds from grants from the Diocese and PPP loans from the SBA.
- Sara pointed out that we have been taking money from our Trust accounts to support the operating budget. She reminded the parish that after Rev. Dustin Berg resigned, we entered a period of discernment about whether or not we wanted a full-time rector. We visited and met with 12 parishes, some with full-time and some with part-time rectors, and concluded that it was important for St. Mark's to have a full-time rector, knowing that it would mean running a deficit. The deficit was planned for but cannot continue forever. Therefore, the Finance Committee is very supportive of Fr RJ's goals for increasing membership and attendance.

TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees of St. Mark's manage all endowment funds for the church. Endowment funds are made up of bequests and donations which generous parishioners and friends have given to St. Mark's to ensure the longevity and well-being of the parish. With the creation of the trust, past parishioners wanted to set up a tool to benefit the church and a vehicle to provide funds for projects and needs beyond normal operating requirements.

There are five Trustees who serve five year terms (maximum two consecutive terms) and who oversee the investment and distribution of the funds. Trustees for 2022 were:

- Maggie Holihan (President)
- Geoff Gordon (Treasurer)
- Rick Crowl (Secretary)
- Drew Pelger
- Charlie Kiesling

Rick Crowl joined for a second term in 2022 and resumed the position of Secretary.

Assets are currently invested in equities, income funds, and money market funds. A small portion of the assets, church library and music program, are restricted to disperse only income. The balance of the fund is available to be used for the benefit of the church with the approval of the Trustees and Vestry.

2022 Financial Report

St. Mark's mission statement, **We seek to unite all people with God and each other in Christ through worship, fellowship, education and service**, reflects this community's discernment of God's call as members of the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement. This examination is not just about money, but also the energy, time, and gifts of St. Mark's clergy, staff, and lay persons. Mission statements do not reflect where we are, rather where we feel called to go. A budget reflects where we are financially. Income and revenue speak to how we as the St. Mark's community value our mission and are willing and able to financially support our mission. Expenses reflect how we utilize that bounty of funds to pursue God's call.

The Finance Committee offers this 2022 Financial Report and 2023 Budget not only as a tool to analyze our financial realities, but more importantly to launch consideration of how we are responding to God's call for us as a community.

Throughout 2022 I have worked closely with the Finance Committee, the Trustees, the Vestry, and Father RJ. to receive, care for, and properly distribute the financial resources you have provided to support the mission of St. Mark's. This report has been designed to provide you with a clear and accessible picture of what resources have been received and how they have been used to further our work. Please do not hesitate to ask me or any member of the Finance Committee about this report or any other financial matter.

A special thank you to Kathy Kennedy for her years of service on the Finance Committee. She and Bob relocated this year. Thank you to John Willoughby, Sara Strattan, and Geoff Gordon for their continued support, and to Chris Arnold and Pam Clark two new members added this year. It is also important to recognize the significant amount of work done by Katie Kuceyeski, our office manager. I also would like to thank the people who offer their time to count the Sunday offering: Joe Hoot, Barrie Thorp, Carol Hayne, Geoff Gordon, Bob Kocab, Christy Thorley, and Rick Werren.

Overview:

- 2022 Operating Budget:
 - Operating income was \$8,086 less than budgeted and expenses were \$5,008 over budget driven by maintenance and utility cost.
 - Operating expenses exceeded operating income by \$72,413.
 - Trust funds (\$48,000) and Cash Reserves (\$24,413) were used to cover the shortfall in income and increased expenses.
 - The use of Trust funds is reviewed and approved annually by the Vestry and Trustees and supports our decision, made in 2019, to hire a full-time rector.
- Mission/Outreach:
 - Thanksgiving Baskets and Community Christmas asked for only cash donations again this year. In 2022, parishioners donated over \$4,000 to be sent to outside organizations.
 - Another \$1,277 was dispersed from the Evangelism/Mission budget line item.
- Capital Improvements:
 - St. Mark's Parking Lot loan from the Dioceses was paid in full in November.
 - Following the recommendation of our interim rectors, the church offices were moved to reduce distraction from the school activities.
 - HVAC upgrades, organ module replacement, and Protech security upgrades were also completed.
- 2023 Operating Budget:
 - Pledge commitment for 2023 is \$171,364. (\$15,000 increase over 2022)
 - Expense budget is \$5,007 over 2022 actual expenses due to inflation.
 - Income shortfall \$66,296 is less than 2022 actual shortfall.
 - Trust Fund withdrawals will increase to \$60,000.
- 2022 Operating Budget Performance, 2023 Operating Budget and the Capital Reserve Status, are attached for more detail.
