

The Lion's Pause




When there is a death in the parish, we sorrow. We do what we can to support the family and friends and, as appropriate, we celebrate a life well lived and commend our friend to God's care. When there are many deaths within a brief period, we may feel challenged to give each the respect that it deserves and to extend our assistance to each family. But we meet that challenge! In the midst of a pandemic, we face an unprecedented challenge in offering the ministry we want to offer in compliance with state and diocesan guidelines. Again, I believe we are meeting the challenge, but we are aware of what we are missing-the opportunity to gather as a parish to offer our prayers, our sorrow, and our support.

Because of the constraints that are in effect, many families at this time are choosing a relatively brief service, the liturgy of Commendation and Committal, which appears on pp. 499-505 in the Book of Common Prayer. Although C&C is in itself a complete and profound liturgy, it does not provide for the readings and reflections we find in the longer liturgy, nor does it include the Eucharist.

For this reason, once the cloud of the coronavirus lifts and we are able to resume our full life as a church, the wardens and I will schedule a special parish service of thanksgiving and remembrance. In addition to sharing our gratitude for deliverance from the pandemic, we will offer the full burial service, with Eucharist, in memory of all of the parishioners we have lost during this difficult period.

Yesterday (Wednesday, July 22) was our opportunity within the church calendar to recall the "apostle to the apostles." The Gospels report that this apostle (a) was a faithful follower of Jesus, (b) was



present when Jesus was crucified and buried, (c) was at the tomb on Easter morning in order to anoint the body of Jesus, (d) was the first of the apostles to experience the risen Christ, and (e) was the bearer of the good news of resurrection to the apostles. No, not Peter. Not Mark. Mary Magdalene!

When we hear conservative voices insisting on an exclusively male priesthood, we might want to think of our first apostle, who was a woman!

The Collect for this day is particularly powerful:

Almighty God, whose blessed Son restored Mary Magdalene to health of body and of mind, and called her to be a witness of his resurrection: Mercifully grant that by your grace we may be healed of all our infirmities and know you in the power of his unending life.

James Kiefer provides related etymological trivia. In the tradition of their odd condensed pronunciations, the British pronounce the name "Magdalene" (as in Magdalen College, Oxford) as "maudlin." Thus, because we associate Mary Magdalene with sorrow for her sins and with weeping for Jesus, our word "maudlin" means sorrowful or sentimental.

You will be able to access the live stream by visiting our **Facebook page** (an account is not required.) Our video content will be the first posted content in the videos section and should indicate that we are "live".


An Appreciation of Mrs. A, part 5, conclusion- Bob Morrison
